Pupil Premium Statement

This academic year the pupil premium grant is £56,200, following our review of disadvantaged learners needs and barriers to learning the grant has been assigned to the following initiatives and interventions that will support these pupils by improving progress and outcomes of pupils, pupil's attendance and supporting children and families.

The funding has been allocated to the following:

- A proportion of funding for Parental workshops to engage parents in school life and support pupils who are on interventions and with attendance.
- A proportion of funding for Learning Support Assistants working directly with disadvantaged learners in the classroom.
- A proportion of funding for Child and family support worker who provides training and support for parents and children.
- A proportion of funding for Emotional literacy support.
- A proportion of funding for Learning Support Assistants working 1:1 with disadvantaged learner on interventions
- A proportion of funding with support the purchase of learning resources and intervention program for Mathematics.

Update on Pupil Premium progress for March 2018

• In year data shows that pupil premium children are making expected progress using the school internally tracking system. This will be reviewed again at the end of the academic year.
