
If you do not have the stories please do not worry as you do not need to have the books to complete the activities. We have added some optional extension activities which we feel all the children in Hedgehogs and Otters can access.

We have also included some online phonics videos which are funded by the Department for Education. These use the same Letters and Sounds programme that we follow in school and are free to watch. The videos begin with Phase 3 phonemes that we have already introduced, so for some children they are good practice for the digraphs and trigraphs that they find tricky and for others, they are a quick revision of phonemes that they already know. We hope you will find them helpful.

Foundation Stage Mathematics

This week we will be using SUMMER TERM WEEK 3 which is a Caterpillar theme.



	Early Learning Goal for Number- Children count reliably with numbers from one to 20, place them in order and say which number is one more or one less than a given number. Using quantities and objects, they add and subtract two single-digit numbers and count on or back to find the answer. They solve problems, including doubling, halving and sharing.	Can you use 'concrete' objects- toys, bricks, fruit to work put different ways of making 10. Can you draw a picture to show your maths? (Grownups- This is called making a pictorial representation) Can you write a number sentence to show your maths? (Grownups- this is called an abstract representation.) Grownups- At this early stage of mathematics the concrete and pictorial representations are <u>really important</u> so don't be tempted to skip these and go straight on to abstract number sentences. It is really important that children have a secure understanding of the concepts behind number sentences- the abstract comes much later but it is good for them to just begin to see the links. Don't worry if they get the symbols muddled up.


