Dear Friends,

As we journey with Jesus into Jerusalem once more, let's be encouraged to stop and pause along the way, contemplating what this immense act of love means for you and me today.

If we were to place ourselves into the story, where would we be standing as Jesus rides into Jerusalem on a donkey. Maybe we are in the thick of it shouting and waving, or maybe we are standing a little further back just taking it all in. What are

we hoping for in our hearts, as we welcome the Prince of Peace once more? Are we willing to lay down our cloaks on the road in an act of both welcome and invitation? Welcoming Jesus into our homes and communities, but also inviting Him to do things his way, rather than in the way that we think things should be done?

Later in the week, as Jesus reclines around the table with his friends, can we imagine ourselves there, sensing the intimacy of the moment? The conversation is flowing but what are the things that we long to say to Jesus, laugh about together, or mourn with him over? As he stands up to remove his outer garments and wash his friends' feet, do we feel a bit like Peter, horrified at the thought of Him washing our feet?

As we sense the atmosphere changing, are we aware of our own acts of betrayal, where we too have chosen the easy way out? Are we prepared to keep watch and pray with Jesus, lifting to the Father all that lies heavy on our hearts?



Standing at the foot of the cross, what do we see and feel? Alongside the agony and horror of it all, are we able to look Jesus in the eye to see the total love that he gazes back upon us with. In that moment, how does it feel to know that we are so totally loved that Jesus was prepared go to any lengths to offer us forgiveness and hope. What does the cross mean to you and me?

And then on the third day, are we one of those who runs to the tomb? What hopes do we lay in the empty space this year? Imagine hearing your name being spoken by Jesus as we stand alongside Mary in the early hours of that morning.

What joy, what hope, what love floods her heart and ours. This is His story, but it is also our story. In the same way that Mary couldn't wait to share the news, we too have a story that is worth sharing and worth hearing. A story that brings transformation and eternal hope.

So let's journey with Jesus through the events of Holy Week together once more, pondering on all that it means for us and for the world that we live in.

Electoral Roll review—St Nicholas' Church

The Electoral Roll is a list of members who are entitled to participate in the government of the church and to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

If anyone who attends St Nicholas, who is not already on the roll, and who would like to be added to the 2024 Electoral Roll, please complete an application form. Blank copies are available at the back of the church. Once completed, please give them to one of the churchwardens or the clergy. Completed forms should be returned by **Thursday 11th April**, ready for our Annual Church Meeting on **Sunday 28th April 2023**.

Who can be on the electoral roll? To be on the electoral roll a person needs to have been baptised, be at least 16 years old and either:

• Living in the parish and a member of the Church of England or a Church in communion with the Church of England

• Not resident in the parish but is a member of the Church of England (or a Church with which the Church of England is in communion) and has regularly attended worship in the parish during the six months prior to enrolment

• A member in good standing of a Church which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity and they are prepared to declare themselves a member of the Church of England, having regularly attended worship during the six months prior to enrolment.
